<u>Year 4 French: Autumn 2</u> My local area, your local area



During this half term the children will revisit colours and write a poem based on Bonfire Night. The children will revisit classroom instructions and useful commands in order to programme their own robots! They will then learn the names of shops in town, discover what shopping is like in France, and learn how to ask where a shop is... in their best robot voices!

Through songs, games, native speaker clips and independent tasks, they will explore the following content, topics and language:

2a - Bonfire Night poem

- Revisit and recall colours
- Write a Bonfire Night poem using colours

2b – Robot town, commands and directions

- Revisit classroom instructions
- Practise writing useful commands
- Explore what shopping is like in France and similarities and differences between here and France
- Practise asking where something is
- Respond with the structure 'Here is...'
- Recognise the names of places in a town written down
- Opportunity to check for learning with Puzzle It Out assessment

Learning Objective for each lesson:

- 1) I can write my own Fireworks poem
- 2) I can read and understand useful commands and instructions
- 3) I can say, understand and write some useful instructions
- I can say and recognise places in a town
- 5) I can ask "Where is...?" with shop names in French
- 6) Check for learning




