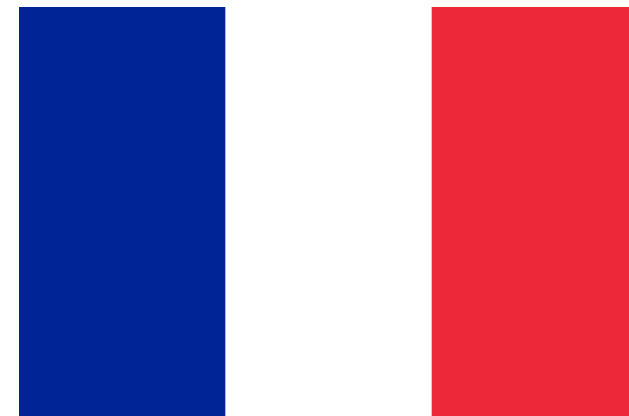


Year 6 French: Autumn 2

Where I live, where you live



In this module:

During this half term the children will learn the names for rooms in a house and explore a French house with opportunity to compare French and English houses. The children will use their reading skills to look at descriptions of rooms in an alien house, and follow a story about a haunted house, leading to their own written description of a haunted house. The children will also have the chance to think about their future aspirations and talk about what they would like to be when they are older.

Through games, native speaker clips and independent tasks, they will explore the following content, topics and language:

2a - Spooky House/Space House

- Compare French and English houses
- Learn nouns for rooms in a house
- Read descriptions of rooms in a house
- Follow a story about a haunted house
- Write a description of a house

2b – Hopes and roles

- Examine cognates and semi-cognates in nouns for professions
- Conduct a survey of jobs for the future
- Express their own future aspirations using a simple sentence and the verb to be
- Opportunity to check for learning with Puzzle It Out assessment

Learning Objective for each lesson:

- 1) I can understand the nouns for rooms in a house
- 2) I can read and understand simple descriptions of rooms in a house
- 3) I can follow and understand a story about a haunted house
- 4) I can write descriptive sentences using colours and size to describe a house
- 5) I can recognise and understand familiar and unfamiliar nouns
- 6) Check for learning
